## Mini-sketch on Francis Cooke:

Francis Cooke was a passenger on the Mayflower in 1620. He married Hester Mayhieu at Leiden, Holland 30 June 1603, the record describing him as a woolcomber, unmarried, from England (MD 8:48). He was probably born no earlier than 1583, as he was under 60 in 1643 when he was on the list of Men Able to Bear Arms at Plymouth, but not much later than that year if he married in 1603. He appears frequently in Plymouth records on juries, as a surveyor of highways, on various committees, and in a number of land transactions (see Bowman's "Francis Cooke and His Descendants, MD 3:95). He came to Plymouth with son John; his wife and children Jane and son Jacob arrived on the Anne in 1623. Two more children, Hester and Mary, were born at Plymouth. John married Sarah Warren, daughter of Mayflower passenger Richard Warren; Jane married Experience Mitchell; Hester married Richard Wright; Mary married John Thompson; Jacob married first Damaris Hopkins, daughter of Stephen of the Mayflower, and second Elizabeth

Lettice. (See Ralph Wood's "Silver Book" Francis Cooke Family, Through Five Generations, Volume 12). Francis died 7 April 1663 (PCR 8:23).
